

Guidelines for Authors

Manuscripts must be submitted electronically in DOC format (Word 6.0 for Windows) or in RTF (Rich Text Format) to the following email address: antinomos@poliba.it

They must be written in English and should be between 5.000 and 7.000 words, single spaced, with a wide margin (4 cm). All pages should be numbered. They should bear the title of the contribution and name(s) of the author(s). The full postal (and eventually e-mail) address of the author(s) should also be included. It should also contain an abstract of no more than 400 words and up to 5 keywords.

Bold characters should not be used, except for the titles (that should be written in bold characters). Underlined characters should not be used, too. Using Italic characters is allowed for subparagraphs and for those names, which require it. Footnotes to the text should be avoided wherever this is reasonably possible. If they must be used, indicate them by superscript numbers in the text, and type them all at the end of the contribution.

Tables and figures should be numbered consecutively in Arabic numerals: (tab. 3); (fig. 7). Tables and figures should be sent separately. The approximate position of tables and figures should be indicated in the manuscript. Figures, photos and artwork must be submitted in suitable condition for publication.

References should be cited in the text by giving the last name of the author(s) followed by the year of publication in parentheses e.g. Hall (1992) or (Hall, 1992). For three or more authors, use the first author followed by *et al.* The full references should include all authors' names and initials, year of publication, title of article or the book, the full title of the journal, volume and page numbers, and for books and other documents, the publisher's name and place of publication e.g.
